

SASNET Activity Report 2018

During 2018 SASNET has conducted a wide range of activities to bolster South Asia research and research related accomplishments at Lund University. SASNET has collaborated with several organizations both within Lund University but also with organizations from all over the country through seminars, publications, networking, and conferences. During 2018 SASNET had three employees: office director/research coordinator Andreas Johansson (100%); researcher Admir Skodo (100%) and teaching assistant Soumi Banerjee (20%).

EVENTS

During the year SASNET hosted several events, most of which were open lectures, but many were also connected to courses. SASNET covered a wide array of topics and invited some of the most prominent South Asia scholars around the world.

18 January

Professor Nishi Mitra vom Berg, held a talk entitled: "Universities as Workplace: Gender Discrimination and Work-Life Balance" at the Center for Middle Eastern Studies.

21 February

Dr. Henrik Chetan Aspengren, held a talk entitled: "'Is India rising? Reflections on Indian foreign policy and its limitations'" at the Center for Middle Eastern Studies.

8 March

Film Screening of the movie India's Daughter at Stora Algatan 4, International Desk, at Lund University.

16 March

The panel consisted of Professor Robert Crews (Stanford University), Anna-Karin Johansson (formed General Secretary of the Swedish Committee for Afghanistan), Dr. Admir Skodo (SASNET, Lund University), and Professor Sari Kuovo (Gothenburg University and Afghanistan Analysts Network). The panel was moderated by Ted Svensson (Political Science, Lund University).

25 April

SASNET hosted a seminar at the Center for Theology and Religious Studies on the Afghan Shia: Politics, Piety, and Diaspora.

7 May

Together with the Swedish Institute of International Affairs (UI), SASNET hosted a seminar in Stockholm on democracy in conflict and post-conflict countries in South Asia. Dr. The seminar was centered around talks delivered by Vagisha Gunasekara, Executive Director, American Institute for Lankan Studies, Sri Lanka and Dr. Admir Skodo (SASNET).

Main speakers of the event were Anita Inder Singh, Founding Professor of the Centre for Peace and Conflict Resolution in New Delhi, and Vittorio Felci, Researcher at Lund University.

19 September

Dr. Atreyee Sen held a talk entitled: "'No city for lovers': Public romance, illicit sex and urban moral policing in Mumbais'" at the Center for Middle Eastern Studies.

20 September

Dr. Henrik Chetan Aspengren, held a talk entitled: "'Is India rising? Reflections on Indian foreign policy and its limitations'" at the Edens hörsal. . The event was in collaboration with UPF.

8 October

SASNET in collaboration with MAVA (Men Against Violence and Abuse) invited students to a documentary screening and lecture held by the founder of this Indian organization.

9 October

UNESCO Chair Ashok Swain gave a talk on climate change and river disputes in South Asia at LUMES.

31 October

SASNET hosted a pa3nel on Hindu nationalism that addressed the particular narratives and discourses of populist politics in India in the light of neoliberal politics and globalization.

1 November

SASNET hosted a lunch seminar with Nitasha Kaul on "The gendered politics of authoritarianism in contested democracies" at the Department of Political Science.

14 December

SASNET and Svalorna Indien, Bangladesh in Lund organized a release party for the new issue of *Sydasien* magazine.

Workshops and Conferences

Throughout 2018 SASSNET has hosted three workshops and helped with the organization of one conference. These events discussed contemporary issues in South Asia and Sweden.

14-15 April

SASNET hosted a workshop on Nationalisms in South Asia. The workshop was generously funded by the Crafoord Foundation. Professor Frank Korom (Boston University), Associate Professor Jan Magnusson (Lund University) and the director of SASNET Andreas Johansson took the lead in organizing the workshop. The core idea of the workshop builds on a generation of scholarship arguing that nationalism was a strictly Western affair. Bengali Nobel Laureate in Literature, Rabindranath Tagore, for example, stated that his homeland India never developed nationalism. However, his book Religious Nationalism (1994) Peter van der Veer provides an important corrective to this scholarship. Van Veer argues that while Asia might not have had "secular" nationalisms, it most certainly produced "religious" nationalisms. This workshop focused on examples from

South Asia to examine whether or not a meaningful comparison can be made within one distinct cultural region – namely, the Indian Subcontinent. In addition to the organizers the workshop saw paper presentations by Peter Van Der Veer (Max Planck Institute for the Study of Religious and Ethnic Diversity, Göttingen), Boris Wille (Martin-Luther-Universität Halle-Wittenberg), Susan A. Reed, (Bucknell University), Mari Miyamoto (Keio University), Mara Malagodi, (City Law School, University of London), and Jürgen Schaflechner (University of Heidelberg). Discussant was Ted Svensson from the Political Science department, Lund University.

27 April

SASNET hosted a workshop on covering the political election in India. The workshop is held at School of Journalism (Jo3urnalistutbildningen), In Liquid Newsroom - an interactive workshop - media researcher Vibodh

Parthasarathi and journalist Divya Rajagopal toke the participants through the process of covering this complex political process.

11-12 May

The Afghanistan and Central Asian Association (ACAA) and SASNET hosted a two-day conference on the situation for Afghan refugees in Sweden. This conference discussed the current situation in Afghanistan, challenges faced by returning refugees and how Sweden can support refugees who return to Afghanistan. It also discussed key dimensions regarding integration in Sweden, including citizenship and legal status, interaction with Swedish authorities and labour market integration. NGOs, the public sector and councils will share experiences of projects supporting different aspects of integration. The speakers came from NGOs, political parties, the public sector and academia. The conference provide a space to shape new ideas and networks to promote learning, inspiration and progress and to provoke conversations that matter. Entrance to the conference was free. Some of the participants were, Dr Nooralhag Nasimi Founder of the ACAA and the European Campaign for Human Rights for the People of Afghanistan, Jorrit Kamminga Ph.D., Research Lead Inclusive Peacebuilding, Rasmus Ling (Miljöpartiet), Prof. Dr Maarten Vink (M.P.) Malmö University, Admir Skodo, SASNET. The conference took place in LUX Aula 3 Helgonavägen, Lund.

7-8 November

Together with the Swedish Institute of International Affairs (UI) SASNET hosted a workshop on the Indo Pacific. The workshop was generally funded by Riksbankens Jubileumsfond. The workshop focused on the emerging

geostrategic arena, referred to as the "Indo-Pacific". The workshop will initiate a project on the implications of a closer Indo-Pacific partnership centring on Japan and India and its effects on European foreign policy, and enable the formation of an international network of scholars working on the topic. In light of the economic and military rise of China and changing regional objectives of the United States many analysts and scholars have called for an "Indo-Pacific" partnership centring on Japan and India. Such a partnership could counterbalance Chinese dominance in the region and secure key trade routes. India in particular has a strong interest in creating a "multipolar world order" that is not dominated by hegemonic superpowers like the United States or China. COMMISSIONED EDUCATION, TEACHING, AND SUPERVISION

SASNET researcher Admir Skodo was the lead teacher of the interdisciplinary EU-funded training program at the Swedish Migration Agency entitled Understanding Asylum, designed to strengthen the legal and scientific basis of asylum investigations. He was responsible for coordinating the work of a group of scholars from psychology, legal studies, cognitive science, philosophy, history, political science, along with a group of experts from the Agency. He was also responsible for developing and delivering seminars on country of origin information (where he often used Afghanistan as a case study and in exercises), source criticism, and critical thinking. He delivered these seminars in October 2018 to asylum officers, Agency experts, and decision makers. But because his contract was not renewed at the end of 2018, he was unable to see through this program through the end.

TEACHING AND SUPERVISION

Admir co-developed and co-taught the course Introduction to Middle Eastern Debates at the Center for Middle Eastern Studies, Lund University, during 2017. He supervised Jia Liu, a Master student in Middle Eastern Studies and Lund University, and her Master thesis on Hazara politics in Afghanistan. Andreas supervised three students on MA-level at the Center for Theology and Religious Studies.

STIMULATION

In order to further stimulate research on South Asia at Lund University SASNET invited applications for research grants on an ongoing basis. SASNET funded the following grants:

- "Gender, Disasters and Climate, Summer School" was granted 102 962 SEK from SASNET. Project manger was Phu Lama at the Risk Management and Societal Resilience, LTH.

- "Electionland" was granted 37 920 SEK. Project manger was Andreas Mattsson, School of Journalism.

IN MEDIA/ OUTREACH

During the year SASNET employess have frequently made media appearances. Andreas Johansson, researcher and director of SASNET, was interviewed on Swedish Radio (Studio Ett) about the latest development in the Maldives, including what this development means for Maldivian democracy. Utrikesmagasinet also interviewed Andreas about the role of religion in the Maldives, including what this development means for Maldivian democracy.

GRANTS

SASNET researcher Admir Skodo received a grant from Magnus Bergvall's Foundation for his research on Afghan refugees and asylum seekers in the United States and Sweden. The grant is in the amount of 30 000 SEK and is to be used for field research in the Afghan community in New York.



Networking

During the year SASNET staff visited conferences and had meeting with South Asian related researchers across the globe. SASNET is keen on working together with Karlstad University since it has, since 1995, been collaborating with various institutions in India. Andreas met with Katarina Plank and Kristian Niemi and discussed KAU:sa study center at Varanasi and its collaboration with Banaras Hindu University (BHU).

In 26-27 April Andreas traveled to Dublin and participated in Ireland India Institute Conference on South Asia. Andreas chaired the Panel: *the Presence of the Past: Revisiting colonialism* and talked to the director Eileen Connolly of future collaboration between SASNET and III.

On June 5-6, the South Asia Across the Nordic Region second annual meeting was held at the University of Oslo. The two-day meeting covered discussions on how to move the network forward as well as different paper panels on South Asian topics. SASNET director, Andreas Johansson, chaired a panel session that included, among others, a paper by Dan Vesalainen Hirslund from the University of Copenhagen entitled "Hierarchies and Solidarities of Urban Labor: Subcontracting, Informalisation and Brokerage in Kathmandu". On the second day SASNET teaching assistant Soumi Banerjee presented her Master's thesis in a presentation entitled "Beyond the Crisis of Identity: (De)constructing 'Self' and 'Other' in the Narratives of Partition of India".

Professor Emeritus Baboo M. Nair represented at scientific collaboration organized by the Department of Food Science, Copenhagen University in association with Danish Ministry of External Affairs, Danish Ministry of Food and Environment, Danish Embassy in India and Indian Embassy in Denmark. Professor. Nair talked about the ongoing SASNET fermented food project at this event.

In October SASNET director Andreas Johansson and SASNET researcher Admir Skodo attended the 47th Annual Conference on South Asia in Madison, Wisconsin and presented their work and SASNET in meetings and panels. During the same week they also meet with representatives from University of Chicago and presented SASNET and ideas for further collaborations.

SASNET researcher Admir Skodo presented a paper entitled "The internationalized state and conflicts: The Afghan diaspora and Afghan statebuilding since 1979" at the international Refugees, Borders and Membership Conference, held at Malmö University October 24-26.

Through a new collaboration between Sydasien and SASNET the magazine once again appears in print, this time biannually. Through SASNET the online version of Sydasien gains more depth as a platform for reports

and articles that present new research on South Asia in a clear and accessible manner. Selected articles appear in the printed version of Sydasien.

SASNET's South Asia Library received a generous donation in the form of a Gandhi Collection from the relatives of the late Professor Lars Lindström.

SOCIAL MEDIA

The past SASNET has been very active on social media (Facebook and Twitter) posting jobs and conferences around the world related to South Asia. This is important to maintain the network idea of SASNET. SASNET do also post job opportunities at Lund University since most of the followers are from South Asia.

SOUTH ASIA INITIATIVE

The Swedish Institute of International Affairs (UI) and the Swedish South Asian Studies Network (SASNET) at Lund University are launching a collaboration focusing on India and South Asia. The long-term collaboration will include both research and analysis and aims at building a strong research environment of international quality. Through the year UI and SASNET have collaborated via some of the above mentions events but also the SAI project have lead to collaborations and ongoing discussions with the Europe India Research and Dialog Network (EIRDN), DISS, SIDA, UD, and Folke Bernadotte Akademin.

As a further step in the collaboration between UI and SASNET is the launch of a series of podcasts on India and South Asia. The project manager for this podcast is Henrik Chetan Aspengren, who is an affiliated researcher at SASNET. In the first episode Professor Gunnel Cederlöf, Linnaeus University, (picture) talked about her research on the India-China corridor, an area that spanned China, India, Bangladesh and Myanmar between 1820-1920.

2019-2020

During 2019-2020 SASNET will have a researcher coordinator and director employed on a 100% basis, and two teaching assistants employed 20% and 10%. During this period SASNET will also start a post-doc project (100%) on religion and politics in South Asia. This project will be connected to the South Asian initiative and will investigate the possibilities of future collaboration between Center for Theology and Religious Studies (CTR) and the Department of Political Science. During the coming years SASNET will continue to take on affiliated researchers to broaden its knowledge production on South Asia.

About SASNET

SASNET's activities take place at Lund University, where SASNET through research, lectures, workshops, and conferences in cooperation with various departments and centers at the University aims to provide and spread perspectives on South Asia. The mandate is national and aims at promoting collaboration between Swedish as well as Nordic universities. It primarily does so through networking activities and the online circulation of a monthly newsletter that publicizes research on South Asia in the Nordic countries.

The network is a subdivision of the Centre for Middle Eastern Studies (CMES).
